## 14-1641. Embezzlement; essential elements. For you to find the defendant guilty of embezzlement [as charged in Count 1<sup>1</sup>, the state must prove to your satisfaction beyond a reasonable doubt each of the following elements of the crime: 1. The defendant converted this \_\_\_\_\_ 2. \_\_\_\_\_ (property or money) to the defendant's own use. "Converting something to one's own use" means keeping another's property rather than returning it, or using another's property for one's own purpose [rather than]<sup>5</sup> [even though the property is eventually used] for the purpose authorized by the owner; At the time the defendant converted \_\_\_\_\_ (property or money), the defendant fraudulently intended to deprive the owner of the owner's property. "Fraudulently intended" means intended to deceive or cheat: This happened in New Mexico on or about the \_\_\_\_\_ day of 4.
